

Anniversaries and birthdays: Jim and Heidi's 4th anniversary will be on July 22nd.

Two bits...dollar: Dave entered \$5 to celebrate the size of beer glasses in Germany. He and Jo Ann have recently returned from a vacation in Europe, which included river cruises. Jim donated \$2 to celebrate his anniversary. He also noted that National night Out will be celebrated in Pollock Pines, and in Camino. Ken donated \$2 to celebrate a great weekend in Mendocino County and a ride on the Skunk Train.

Acknowledgements: Carol noted articles in the Mountain Democrat, including a letter to the editor by Becky on the Independence Day parade that our club had sponsored, and an article on the recent Miss Pollock Pines pageant. Two items of significance were that Ken was the Master of Ceremonies, and Miss Pollock Pines, Lauryn Roy, had been president of the Sierra Ridge Interact Club when she was in the eight grade at Sierra Ridge Middle School.



The event has had from 250 to as many at 280 riders. Roughly 10% are from Nevada, with the majority coming from California, many of them from the Bay area. They bring revenue to the area through hotel stays, meals, and other tourist expenditures. The rides are not timed, and there is no mass start. Traffic impact is minimized and there is little or no need for law enforcement assistance. Motherlode Century provides follow vehicles, radio communication, first aid, fluids and energy foods for the riders, and mechanics. Riders tend to be financially sounds individuals with an average age of 54. Many of them ride bikes worth \$8,000. They tend to be dedicated riders who will spend money for the experience.

Swain has a number of business sponsors, some outlined in the handout. They recognize the value of the event to their businesses. He is looking for support on the ride day, and the spreading of awareness of the ride. There are a number of bike events of this type, including 35 in Northern California alone. He once had to run an event on the same day as a Rotary club in Nevada City, and notes that 14 different Rotary clubs in Northern California run similar events during the year.

He is open to the idea of partnering with not-for-profit organizations.

Debunking for President Dave: Tentatively scheduled for July 30th at the Crystal Basin Winery. Eric needs a head count. He will send an email to the entire club to get the count.

501c3 update: Eric and Carol met with the Cameron Park Rotary Club Foundation officers regarding possibly doing business with them. Eric will put this item on the club assembly meeting agenda, for next week. The Foundation needs an application by August 1.

EITO: The event needs a chairperson. Call Eric if you are interested in being the chair. Dave noted that there is an SOP document for this event, which should be very helpful to a chairperson.

Sugarloaf: Jack and Ken plan to attend the takedown of the site on July 25th. Dennis is a maybe.

Other items: Kevin will be out of town until August 4th, and will not have his telephone or a computer.
